This the Brussels World's Fair 1958 seeks to do


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## THE ATOMIUM

Towering over the Fair and its environs is the 320 foot high Atomum, theme structure of Brussels 158. It symbolizes the atomic composition of a crystal of metal enlarged 150 billion times. The mine "atoms" of this crystal are steel spheres of 55 foot diameter, each sheathed in brilliant light metal. Points of light rotating about each sphere simulate the orbits of electrons. Visitors will find displays of peaceful uses of atomic energy in the lower spheres which are joined by tabbs containing high

Europe's fastest elevator speeds visitors to the Atomium's top phere which houses a restaurant offering the finest Belgian cuisine. Giant portholes efford a spectacular panorama of the Fair and the city of Brassels, from the equivalent of 30 stories up.



#### ORGANIZATION AND FEATURES



More than two hundred halls and pavilions, comprising a breathtaking look into our architectural future, sweep across five hundred acres of verdant and ancient woodlands in Heysel Park, four miles from the heart of Brussels. The four main exhibit areas:

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- Foreign pavilions of 48 nations demonstrating how peoples throughout the world live, work and play—how they think, act and create.
- International pavilions of seven great international organizations which serve manking everywhere.
- 3. Belgian exhibits dramatizing the newest techniques in industry, business, public welfare and research.
- 4. The Belgian Congo and Ruanda-Urundi a panorama of life in Belgian Africa: arts, crafts and economic and social progress.

The Brussels World's Fair 1958 ranks as a "first category universal exhibition." It is organized in accordance with the Paris Convention of 1928, which governs the scope and frequency of international exhibitions. The last exposition of this kind was the New York World's Fair of 1930-1940. Brussels '58 presents the world's finest creative endeavors in a galaxy of unique displays, international festivals and cultural events.

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



#### UNITED STATES PAVILION




Set on a landscaped site of six and one-half acres, the United States Pavilion is the world's largest free-span circular structure, with a diameter of 340 feet and height of 95 feet. A glittering complex of amber-tinted steel columns and honeycomb plastic walls, the Pavilion contains two floors of exhibits keyed to the theme of "America—The Land and the People." Adjoining it is an 1100-seat theater.







Clearly marked signposts to the Fair guide motorists over the recently-completed network of superhighways. To insure accommodations for all, "Logexpo" maintains the latest information on hotels, motels, pensions and private homes throughout Belgium. The most advanced electronic equipment, assimilating this information, provides instantaneous bookings to suit individual needs. In welcome, each city and hamlet in Belgium has decked itself with flowers. And to every visitor the people of this shining land extend a hand in friendship.





# A CENTURY OF WORLD'S FAIRS

Hundreds of fairs and exhibitions take place each year in all parts of the globe. These range from purely local events to international trade fairs which display the products and techniques of many exhibitors. But world expositions such as the Brussels World's Fair 1958 are described officially as "first category universal exhibitions"-and they occur far less frequently.

Formal arrangements governing world's fairs were concluded in the Paris Convention of 1928. Thirty-five signatory nations agreed on a minimum interval of six years between successive world's fairs and fifteen years between those organized by the same sponsoring nation. Moreover, unlike lesser international exhibitions. which are usually limited to a single area of activity, a world's fair must survey the entire spectrum of human enterprise and achievement. Its purpose must be to reveal in the broadest possible terms the personality of the age it represents.

Under the definitions laid down by the Paris Convention, only thirty international exhibitions to date rank as world's fairs. The first was the famed Crystal Palace Exposition held in London in 1851. Since that spectacular premiere, many others—the Paris Exposition of 1889 which gave France the Eiffel Tower, and the Chicago Fair of 1893 which accurately chronicled a century of progress—have become landmarks in the history of their times. Twelve great world's fairs have taken place in Belgium. The most recent world's fair was held in New York City in 1939 and 1940. Continuing the tradition begun more than a century ago, the Brussels World's Fair 1958 is the first in nearly two decades and the first of our Atomic Age.
